# WORKER CLASSIFICATION GUIDE



Here's a breakdown of the differences between an Employee, Independent Contractor, and Subcontractor, along with example questions business owners can ask themselves when trying to determine which category someone falls under



### **EMPLOYEE**

#### **Definition:**

A person hired by a business who works under the control and direction of the employer. The business withholds income taxes, pays employer taxes, and may provide benefits.

#### **Key Characteristics:**

- Business controls what work is done and how it's done
- Works regular hours set by the business
- Uses business tools, equipment, and space
- Eligible for benefits (health insurance, PTO, etc.)
- Covered by labor laws and workers' compensation

#### **Ouestions to Ask:**

- Do I control how, when, and where the person works?
- Am I providing training, tools, or ongoing supervision?
- Is the worker performing a role that is central to my business operations?
- Will they work long-term or indefinitely for my business?
- Do I plan to offer benefits or withhold taxes?

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### INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

#### **Definition:**

A self-employed individual hired to complete specific work or projects with minimal oversight. Responsible for their own taxes and business expenses.

#### **Key Characteristics:**

- Controls how and when the work is done
- Provides own tools/equipment
- Works for multiple clients
- Not eligible for benefits
- Paid by invoice (not on payroll)
- Files own taxes using a 1099

#### **Questions to Ask:**

- Is the worker free to take on work from other clients?
- Do they set their own schedule and methods?
- Are they using their own tools and resources?
- Do they invoice me rather than getting paid through payroll?
- Would a written contract define the project scope and deadline?

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### SUBCONTRACTOR

#### **Definition:**

A third-party hired by an independent contractor or business to perform a portion of the work under a larger contract or project.

#### **Key Characteristics:**

- Typically works under a contractor, not directly for the end client
- Has a specific scope of work defined in a subcontract agreement
- May be a solo worker or a business entity
- Paid by the contractor (not directly by the client)
- Also typically a 1099 worker

#### **Ouestions to Ask:**

- Is this person being hired by another contractor rather than my business?
- Are they performing a defined piece of a larger contract?
- Am I overseeing them directly, or is someone else (a general contractor) managing their work?
- Do they have their own business entity or insurance?
- Is there a written subcontractor agreement?
